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Open Space Forum

Open Space Technology is a method for convening groups around a specific question or task or importance and giving them responsibility for creating both their own agenda and experience.

Open Space Technology works best when the work to be done is complex, the people and ideas involved are diverse, the passion for resolution (and potential for conflict) are high, and the time to get it done was yesterday. It is a powerful way to get people and organisations moving - when and where it's needed most.

The principles of Open Space Technology were explained at the beginning of the forum, they include:

- Whoever comes is the right people
- Whatever happens is the only thing that could have happened
- Whenever it starts is the right time
- When it's over, it's over

There is only one law, the *law of two feet*. If at any time during the forum, you find yourself in any situation where you are neither learning nor contributing, use your two feet, go someplace else.

- Need more gatherings for whole community/intergenerational. Not sports or gardens –
 just coming together. Meetings of committees to join forces or see how we can help
 each other.
- Induction packages for new comers to town.
- Do we have too many committees? Pool together.
- Better places to gather show grounds.

- Talison \$/mining companies/our professional bodies are extremely helpful and supportive.
- Lets have another drop in space for youth in Greenbushes.
- Community bus costs \$100/hour. Let's have our own bus!

Main Points:

Andrew - Shire weed control officer

- Bio Security Group is a group of volunteers (One paid position Exec Officer)
- Since the demise of the Ag Department this group has been given the task of bringing certain weeds and animals (rabbits, foxes, feral pigs) under control in communities.
- Social pressure Pride, shame, guilt could be a way to involve community members in the task.
- Passion of the Group is great but need people with time
- Goal Pest Management Plan first must be supported by community, once supported by the community the Minister for Agriculture can deem a levy, state then matches \$ for \$
- How is Levy calculated? community consultation and public meetings Community Pride (DAFWA have a levy calculating model)
- Two weeks time "Today Tonight" about Cleavers DAFWA needs more money to be allocated to regions (17th Dec)
- Promote protecting-our community (along with SES, etc)
- Goal is to focus on problem (Cleavers in SW area) & promote to community, schools.
- Group have \$22,000 in bank and have several other funding applications submitted, levy will take 12-18 months to happen (educate community first so they are happy to pay levy)
- Need people passionate about controlling weeds/feral animals but also need people with other skills such as social media, desktop publishing, talking to people (community engagement)
- Need to tap into existing networks such as Bushfire brigade, walking club etc
- Images! to assist people to recognise Cleavers and other weeds. (expand from Facebook page)
 - our biosecurity group is very much on the front foot and is moving faster than DAFWA was prepared for. We are helping to set the field for other groups and areas and are ensuring Bridgetown Greenbushes issues receive priority attention.
 - Biosecurity is undergoing a massive change and is a fast moving topical and political issue currently
 - We are re-branding and looking to expand our footprint to include Boyup, Nannup,
 Balingup new name Blackwood Biosecurity

- Where would funding come from? (\$5,000) for the food, facilitator. Grant? Fundraising? Donated time?
- Venue Park? Primary School? Bridgetown? Greenbushes?
- Timing not Christmas. Expo in March, Meeting in September.
- How to get word out? People who are members of other community groups. Take this back to their group; report on what has been discussed and encourage them to attend future ones.
- Social media, mailbag, noticeboards, Greenbushes-Balingup newsletter.
- Core organiser/co-ordinator.
- How can we create more interest?

Main Points:

E.g. Balingup (or any country town) – apart from coffee shops and school; no jobs.

- Bridgetown: pros on main highway, will have NBN.
- Cottage industries? Must be sustainable
- With highway and internet don't need a critical mass to dispose of product in town
- Develop personal skills and business skills of young people after school. Devise a programme to do this on a rural site.
- In todays climate have to have Registered Training Organisation (RTO) status, but can bring them in.
- Teach trade skills; "tinkering shed" by building say mini houses.
- All requires seed capital
- Also applies to older people, especially in property maintenance.
- Many people come here for lifestyle and only work when want to. Demographic of Bridgetown – largest age group is >60s, although with 15-20% youth need to create work to keep them in town.
- Expensive for businesses to employ anyone, e.g. overheads. Most businesses can't afford to employ anyone.
- Co-operative for Blackwood Valley distribution point in Bridgetown? Local produce, products, eg craft products.
- There are many small businesses around...
